Sara's Story

"Don't get too attached. She won't make it through the night." The doctor's words hung heavy.

Sara was the first child born to Steve, a U.S. Army Captain and Nancy, a Labor and Delivery Nurse. The pregnancy had been unremarkable.

Shocked and dumbfounded, this young couple chose to hold onto hope as they cradled their Sara. They thought, "Doctors know much. And, God knows more." Pressing into their faith, they prayed. They waited. Sara DID make it through the night. Then the week, followed by months and now, years.

At birth, one of Sara's initial diagnoses was that all of the sutures of her skull were fused - meaning there was no "soft spot", no room for her brain to grow.

The impetus to open the first Ronald McDonald House in Philadelphia in 1974 came from a young family with a sick daughter. Part of the impetus to open our Ronald McDonald House in 1987 was Sara Correll.



While Sara underwent life-saving surgery at Denver Children's Hospital, the care and compassion her family received staying at the Ronald McDonald House made a profound impact. "Why can't we have something like that in Colorado Springs?" her parents wondered.

With their question, Sara's parents reached out to Dr. Genrich, Sara's Pediatrician. Dr. Genrich helped connect Sara's parents with others who were also pursuing the dream of having a Southern Colorado Ronald McDonald House that would serve as a temporary "home-away-from-home" for families of critically ill children.

Together, their dreams took root. With a cadre of supporters, the doors to the 101st Ronald McDonald House opened on Valentine's Day, 1987. *Center stage, cutting the ribbon for the "House-that-Love-Built" was two-year-old Sara.*

Fast forward to August of 2019. After a few years in a capital campaign, the day arrived to open the doors to the newly-built 25,000 square foot, ADA-compliant Ronald McDonald House. Alongside a group of passionate supporters, all of whom joined together, daring to dream big dreams, was **AGAIN Sara**, **helping cut the ribbon for the 4223 Royal Pine Drive Ronald McDonald House**.

The years in between were full. Sara has undergone 33 surgeries; the first, at four months, "" believed her survive as one of three specialist surgeons in the world (at the time) opened her skull.



The other surgeries have helped Sara thrive. Her last major surgery (in 2015) had surgeons again removing part of Sara's skull, this time, along with the top of her C-1 vertebrae to help relieve some of the pressure that comes with the Chiari malformation.

Through her teenage years, Sara's family chose to live deeply, even when much was unknown. Often, they would volunteer at the Ronald McDonald House, making meals and helping support families with critically ill children in other ways. Sara felt like she was giving back to a cause that provided much for her and her family.

Now, a Mom to four children, Sara and her husband, Kelly, take each day as a gift, knowing who it is that holds their days. "God's got me," Sara says. She and Kelly help instill faith in their kids that "God's got them, too."

When their son, Peter (now 9), was born sharing some of the same diagnoses as his Mom, Sara recalled

Kelly saying, "You are the one best equipped to be his Mom. You've walked this road." Thankful for his words, Sara expressed gratitude for her husband. "Kelly is the calm and collected one. He is fully present, meeting everyone where they are, regardless of circumstance."

Reflecting back, Sara added, "One of the things my parents did beautifully well was to not borrow trouble. I learned to live without worry." Sara knows first-hand, that we can only do what we know to do, pressing in with our best abilities.

Sara and Kelly's modern day life is vibrant, filled with the delight that comes with their three-ring circus - that of children, laughter, work, play, meals and enjoying Colorado's beauty.

Even when MUCH was going on, Sara felt a 'tug' in her spirit; a yearning to do "more". Responding to that 'tug', Sara joined the Ronald McDonald House Charities of Southern Colorado's Board of Directors, bringing years of knowledge and personal experience to her positions.

It is fitting that in this - Ronald McDonald House Charities of Southern Colorado's 35th year of providing unduplicated care and services for those facing unforeseen medical crisis - Sara is our Board President.

Helping guide the charity and the decisions the board drives, Sara shared, "Serving in the capacity of President of the Board of Directors is such an honor. It's a privilege and a JOY!" She added, ""To give back to the House that has blessed my family and me so much -- and is now blessing my son... it's come full circle. Truly, it's the least I can do."

Sara pressed on. "I'm really focused on legacy; that which we leave behind, long after we're gone. I hope my impact will encourage others to get involved and do what they can to help those they love know they are loved; that they are seen. It's so important for all of us to not feel alone and to not be alone, especially when we need it most."



In 2021, "The House That Love Built" served 553 families (1,500 adults and children) and provided 720 meals.

We are grateful for the many incredible volunteers who helped us serve our families - especially during an unprecedented pandemic. Your giving spirit, hard work and commitment helped keep families safe and healthy, allowing us to keep our doors open for families who needed us most.

We are now thrilled to have lifted COVID capacity restrictions, enabling us to keep even more families on site at our Ronald McDonald House, just steps away from their hospitalized children. THANK YOU, friends and supporters. You have helped us do what we do best....serve our families by keeping them close to their hospitalized child and the care they need. Truly, your gifts of time, talent and treasure have blessed families in crisis; you've helped make this House their "home".

Our Ronald McDonald Family Rooms are again OPEN in Children's Hospital Colorado, Colorado Springs and St. Francis Medical Center. Shifts are from 9 am -1 pm, 1 pm - 5 pm and 5 pm - 8 pm.

These private spaces – located just footsteps of where their hospitalized child is receiving the best possible medical care - are peaceful, intimate and comfortable. These Rooms invite family members to take a moment to rest and compose, allowing them to catch their breath during times of unforeseen medical crisis.
