"Before the arrival of Struthers, Eli and I had dreams of outdoor adventures, family hikes, bike rides and living the Colorado lifestyle as a family of three. However, our family of three almost became a family of one in fall, 2014. "



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My husband, Eli, wondered which bedside to be at.

With me in the Cardiac ICU and our son, Struthers, fighting for his life across the hospital, we experienced some of the darkest hours of our lives.

A social worker told us she had a room ready at the Ronald McDonald House.

For my family, staying at the House meant we no longer needed to decide who would be alone at night in the busy hospital room. We didn't have to navigate a late night drive on a long, dark highway when we were already exhausted. There was no worrying where our next meal would come from, or that the hospital cafeteria and restaurants would be closed when we left our child's bedside. We no longer needed to tell friends and family that there was no place to visit, hug, cry, grieve or pray privately.

With the Ronald McDonald House, we never felt we were walking this awful road alone.

I'm grateful for our "Home-Away-from-Home". While not a place we prepared for - or dreamed of - the warmth, comfort, friendship and strength found inside the walls of the House was more than we ever hoped for in our hours, days, weeks and months of greatest need.

When we first learned we were expecting, we were overjoyed - and cautious - as I was high risk. A team of medical experts was committed to helping us navigate our dream of having a family.

As much as we learned, we knew our little boy might arrive early. However, nothing prepared us for the downward spiral both mine and his health would take. Beginning at around 25 weeks' gestation, I was already inpatient with twice-daily fetal monitoring and weekly ultrasounds. The results painted a scary picture. Our child was not growing (dropping from 20th to 11th to 3rd percentiles) and he didn't have a normal heart rate for his gestational age.

When my blood pressure stabilized, our precious son suffered. For 16 days, it was a delicate balance. And, then the scales tipped. Simplified, instead of my body sustaining him, he began sustaining me.

After an abnormal fetal monitoring and ultrasound confirmed the blood flow was not reaching our son, it became obvious that he would do better outside my womb. It was time to call Fli He rushed to the hospital and walked into my empty room, as I had already been whisked to the OR.

Seeing each other, there were tears of relief as the delivery room nurses 'suited Eli up', preparing for a cesarean-section. After recording a little video for our son and snapping a couple of pictures, I squeezed Eli's hand tighter than I ever thought possible.

#### And, then, we heard a cry.

None of us were expecting that. Between the dire-sounding fetal monitoring and knowing that, at 27 weeks, our son's lungs weren't yet fully developed, I wondered if that's really what I'd heard. And then it was there, again. That sweet sound marked the beginning of an incredible journey with a little 1-lb miracle boy.

Soon, I recovered and was released from the hospital.

What an incredible gift it was to stay together as Struthers fought for his life. We were told to expect a 3-month stay in the NICU. We watched as this tiny human fought multiple infections, a heart defect, vision problems and lungs too fragile to work for themselves.

For months, anytime we walked into the Ronald McDonald House or a Family Room – even when we carried grief, sadness or fear - we left with hope, gratefulness and joy. *The people, routines and emotions experienced inside those walls will change people's lives forever.* 

Staying at the Ronald McDonald House helped us understand how to change other things, too - ventilator settings, to do daily "cares", and eventually, feeding our son as he grew. There was time for snuggling and kangaroo care. **We were thankful!** 

After 105 days, Struthers was discharged from the NICU. As a micro-preemie, he's had his share of setbacks. Each time, Ronald McDonald House has helped our family turn our darkest hours into a miracle of love, comfort and provision.

Struthers continues to grow and develop at his own little pace, remaining on oxygen for 6 years (still needing it periodically). This year, his feeding tube was removed. We continue to celebrate every milestone - he's come so far.

Today, our son is a thriving, happy, brilliant and resilient 7-year old. Our 2nd Grader loves playing with legos, reading, skiing, swimming, frisbee and golf. Recently, he completed a 15 - mile bike ride over a Colorado mountain pass.

Our family enjoys serving and finding special ways to "give back" to a place that is such an integral part of our harrowing, miraculous journey.





A: Our Ronald McDonald House becomes a HOME for families of critically ill children who are receiving the care they require at area hospitals.

#### Q: Are families charged for their stay?

A: No. Families are never charged for staying at the Ronald McDonald House - whether here for days, weeks or months.

#### Q: Do you accept volunteers?


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## Our House
