









"And, a little child shall lead them."

This story is one of Hope. And, of heartache.

It's about a little boy and a family who wouldn't give up. It's about a Ronald McDonald House that provided the care and support they needed, when they needed it most. And, despite their deep pain, it's about choosing to bless others who are also facing an unforeseen medical crisis.

How many times have you felt as if you were 'hitting a wall' - when life was hard and complicated questions had no easy answers – when the help and support you needed felt just out of reach?

For more than ten months, Michelle and Chris Schulze knocked - then banged - on doors that were closed. As new parents, they were desperately seeking answers, looking for the care their young son, Liam, required. "We shared our concerns, asking doctors and specialists for diagnostic tests, to learn what was wrong with our beautiful, little boy."

When they finally received a diagnosis, it brought neither understanding, nor relief.

More questions were asked, as there was much to learn. Their quest took Michelle, Liam and Liam's "Grammie", Rose Ann, to Cincinnati, seeking the best possible medical care Liam required.

In the midst of much unknown, their family felt immense relief when they learned they didn't need to knock on the doors to the Ronald McDonald House - or try and push them open - to be seen or



heard. Instead, the doors to the Ronald McDonald House were lovingly held open for them, for as long as their family needed to stay.

Michelle said, "Being able to stay at the Ronald McDonald House, just across the street from Liam, was our saving grace! They provided us with everything we needed, including meals and support. My mom and I took turns at the hospital while my husband stayed in Colorado, working to maintain our health insurance." She added, **"We did that for six months. I don't know** *what we would have done if the Ronald McDonald House wasn't available.*"



Michelle and Chris were first time parents. Liam was born premature, weighing just 4 pounds, 15 ounces. "He was small, but perfect in every way", they said.

At four months old, Liam developed a fever that lasted more than five days. The doctor said, "It's a virus. Treat him with Tylenol and Motrin." However, the next month, the same thing happened: another high fever, lasting five to seven days. These new parents were told it was common for babies to be sick within their first year. Chris and Michelle continued to treat Liam's symptoms, doing their best to keep him comfortable until the episode passed.

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This pattern continued for nearly a year. Every time, Chris and Michelle asked doctors for more information. Referred to dozens of specialists, all the tests came back inconclusive.

Soon, Liam had other symptoms: his abdomen was distended; he had a sunburn-like rash on his arms and legs and a yellowish tint to his skin. Chris and Michelle couldn't bear watching their 14-month-old son suffer. They drove to Denver Children's Hospital, about an hour from their home in Colorado Springs.



A fellow on rotation saw Liam. She thought he might have HLH (Hemophagocytic Lymphohistiocytosis). A blood and bone marrow test were ordered. The results came back positive. At first, Michelle and Chris were relieved to learn it wasn't cancer, believing they could fight for their son from a place of knowing. The doctor shared that HLH was more aggressive and more unpredictable than most cancers. Liam started chemotherapy and steroid treatment immediately, hoping to increase his chances of survival.

So little was known about HLH. The prayer was that starting treatment would help save their little boy. At first, it seemed promising, with Liam responding well - eating and drinking and acting like himself again. Rose Ann began researching an HLH specialist, finding Dr. Lisa Filipovich at

Cincinnati Children's Hospital.

Michelle said, "I was told that Dr. Filipovich and her team had treated more than 30 children with

HLH in the last three years with bone marrow transplant with 95% currently surviving." She added, "Receiving this message was one of HOPE for us and for Liam!" Michelle, Rose Ann and Liam went to Cincinnati in search of a cure. They were willing to do whatever it took to have their happy, healthy son back.

*Because that's what we do for those we love - we find a way.* Hospitals and Ronald McDonald House Charities know this, providing family centered care that keeps families close during times of medical crisis. "Arriving in Cincinnati, we quickly got settled into our room at the Ronald McDonald House", Michelle said. Across the street, doctors said Liam was the healthiest HLH kid there. They again felt their hope surge.



However, sometimes hope dances with despair. During the months that followed, Liam's suffering continued. It was hard on their family to be apart. Chris would fly out whenever he could, but the distance and the not knowing took its toll.

Michelle recalls hope starting to fade when they learned that from a 13-million-person international bone marrow search, not one match was found. Sadly, time was not on their side; they couldn't hold off on transplant anymore. Liam was slipping away.

Chris joined Michelle and Rose Ann in Cincinnati. They asked Liam's doctors if the end was near. The response was, "As of right now, no. But, it's an hour-to-hour basis."



Within 24 hours of his return to Colorado, Chris learned that Liam had contracted a virus and was in kidney failure. He immediately hopped on the next flight to be with his son and his family.

Reflecting back, Michelle said, "There were more than 20 medical staff in our room. I watched as Liam's vital signs plummeted." She went on, "I looked at the attending physician who was working on Liam. He returned my gaze, shaking his head as if to say 'no'. I knew the fight was over." Michelle's heart sank. Their son was dying and Chris was mid-flight trying to get back.

#### In just a moment, everything changed.

The profound beauty of a Mother's Heart. Michelle requested her Liam be disconnected from all the

equipment so she could just hold her son. She told him it was okay to go be with Jesus. She sang his favorite songs to him as he took his last breath. Sadly, Chris did not arrive in time to say goodbye to his son.

Travelling back to Colorado, Michelle found everything as she had left it six months earlier. Her arms ached to again hold her beloved son. Even in the midst of experiencing profound grief *Michelle knew she needed to channel her energy, her passion and her love for her son into something meaningful. From that, Liam's Lighthouse Foundation (LLF) was born.* 

The legacy Liam left has lit a path for other families facing the same diagnosis. LLF raises awareness, creating and providing the medical community with unbiased, factual information about HLH, ensuring others aren't left in the dark. In addition, they raise awareness about becoming a blood and bone marrow donor. Their family hopes - and prays - that more research will bring safer and more effective treatments and, one day, a cure for HLH.

Michelle said, "My heart is filled with gratitude that, to date, LLF has donated just under a million dollars to directly support our mission." Part of that comes from a decade of hosting an annual 5K run. This year, for the first time, the 5K to Fight Histio will be held in Colorado Springs on July 16th,

with a portion of the proceeds supporting our House. This race brings Histio families together from all over the world, helping them know they are not alone. To donate or to register, go to www.5KToFightHistio.org.

Looking back, Michelle said, "One thing we will FOREVER be thankful for was our six-month stay at the Ronald McDonald House in Cincinnati." She paused. *"I honestly don't know how we* would have made it there as long as we did without the House. They are an incredible organization and such an integral part of families surviving journeys like Liam's. I knew from the start of LLF that supporting RMHC would be mandatory for us."



Fast forward to 13 years later. After their experience at the Cincinnati Ronald McDonald House, Rose Ann began volunteering at our House. While there, she learned we were doing a playground renovation, ensuring the outdoor space was accessible for ALL children to play. Together, she and RMHCSC staff began dreaming of how LLF might be of help in creating new, adaptive spaces.

#### **Heartstrings 4**

This led to the creation of a custom-built lighthouse that stands 12' high. This "beacon of hope" delights kids and adults who turn the wheel, watching the "light" caught from the sun, refracting a rainbow onto the ground. And, isn't that the way? Liam was a bright light. When the sun shone on him, he reflected that to all around him. Even in his passing, Liam has been a beacon of HOPE,

lighting the way for other children and families who are knocking on doors to learn more about HLH.

It's been said. "A little child shall lead them." And. Liam has. As the first permanent installment to an inclusive outdoor playground, Liam has led the way. At a ribbon cutting ceremony, Chris, Michelle and Liam's brothers, Callan and Finn, were joined by Rose Ann and husband, Frank. They shared what it meant to have Liam's memory be a permanent harbinger of hope at our "House that Love Built".
